Air Quality Alert Issued for Yakima Area

The National Weather Service ("NWS") has issued an air quality alert for the Yakima area that is in effect until 12:00 pm Saturday, August 5th.

The alert is due to smoke from wildfires in Eastern Washington, British Columbia, and Montana, NWS officials said. Northeast winds are pushing smoke through the area and air quality could be unhealthy at times this week.

Pollutants in smoke can cause burning eyes, runny nose, and aggravate serious health problems such as heart and lung diseases. Children, the elderly and individuals with respiratory illnesses are most at risk of serious health effects.

NWS officials advise limiting outdoor activities and keeping children indoors during times of poor air quality. Anyone who experiences respiratory distress should speak with their physician.

Also this week, the Yakima area continues to be under a heat advisory the NWS issued on Monday. Temperatures in the City of Yakima could reach as high as 107 degrees during the heat advisory, which is expected to end at 8:00 pm Friday, August 4th.

The combination of hot temperatures and low humidity will create a situation in which heat illnesses are possible, the NWS advisory cautions.

Weather officials encourage residents to schedule strenuous activities over the next few days in the early morning or evening during the heat advisory. The NWS advisory also suggests residents take extra precautions such as drinking plenty of fluids, staying out of the sun and checking up on relatives and neighbors.
