Free concerts and movies this summer at City of Yakima parks



Viva La Musica returns to Miller Park and Martin Luther King Jr. Park this summer

Events kick off July 12-14

City of Yakima parks will be alive with the sound of music – and movies – during three different series that begin next week.

"The idea is to encourage families to bring blankets or lawn chairs and enjoy the free concerts and films outdoors," said Parks & Recreation Manager Ken Wilkinson. "The community is invited to relax and listen to great music or watch family films in a beautiful park."

The Summer Sunset Concert Series at Franklin Park, 2101 Tieton Drive, will kick things off on Friday, July 12th with Bart Roderick & Friends.

Other performances - all from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm on Fridays - include Camille Bloom on July 19th, Snaccs on July 26th, Ian McFeron Band on August 2nd, Cosmos's Dream on August 9th and the Joe Brooks Quartet on August 16th.

The Viva La Musica Concert Series also returns and this again will be held at two City parks from 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm each Sunday evening.

Viva La Musica begins Sunday, July 14 at Miller Park, on the corner of North 4th Street and East E Street, with Rebeldes de la Sierra. Miller Park will host Victor Manuel y su Nueva Juventud on July 21, and Los Plebes de Tierra Caliente on July 28.

Martin Luther King Jr. Park, on the corner of South 8th Street and East Beech Street, will feature Viva La Musica concerts by Liberados on August 4th, La Cuarta Generacion DTC on August 11th, and Senal de Oaxaco on August 18th.

Viva La Musica's finale for this summer will be from 4:00 pm to 7:00 pm on September 15th at Miller Park.

The September 15th finale will feature entertainment by Extremo Sierreno and Mariachi Wenatchee.

As for the movies, the Outdoor Summer Cinema Series returns Sunday, July 14th to the City's Chesterley Park, on the corner of 40th Avenue and River Road. The movies will each begin at sunset, about 8:30 pm, on six consecutive Sundays.

The film series begins with "Incredibles 2" on July 14th, "Beethoven" on July 21st, "Kung Fu Panda" on July 28th, "Finding Nemo" on August 4th, "Ralph Breaks the Internet" on August 11th, and "Shazam" on August 19th.

Operation Invictus partners fighting violent crime

Yakima Police Department one of many agencies participating in enforcement program

The Yakima Police Department (YPD) and a dozen other local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies are joining together for what's being called Operation Invictus, a targeted effort to identify, locate, and apprehend violent crime fugitives throughout the Central Washington region this summer.

addition to YPD, local law enforcement agencies participating in Operation Invictus include the Yakima County Sheriff's Office, Union Gap Police Department, Kennewick Police Department, Benton County Sheriff's Office, Yakima County Prosecutor's and the Yakama Nation Office, Department of Public Safety.

The Washington State Department of Corrections Community Response Unit is also part of the effort.

Federal partners include the FBI, the The goal of Operation Invictus, which federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, the U.S. Marshals Service, the Pacific Northwest Violent Offender Task Force, and the U.S. Attorney's Office.

The Washington State Fusion Center, which supports public safety and homeland security missions of federal, state, local, and tribal agencies, and Maike and Associates, a research consulting firm, are also part of the team.

is an element of Project Safe Neighborhoods and the Violent Crime Reduction Initiative, is simple – make communities safer.

"The combined resources, knowledge, and expertise of the various agencies that are partnering in this operation are significant," said Yakima Police Chief Matt Murray.

"Together, we'll concentrate apprehending violent crime offenders who have warrants for their arrest. Taking those offenders off of the street will have an immediate impact in making the communities of Central Washington safer," said Murray.

Murray underscored that immigration enforcement is not an element of the operation.

"All of the agencies involved in the operation focused are apprehending known, violent their fugitives regardless of residency status," said Murray.

Yakima Fire Department announces new deputy fire chief

A longtime employee with the Yakima Fire Department (YFD) is now its new Deputy Fire Chief.

Jeremy Rodriguez, a 22-year employee with YFD, began his new role as Deputy Fire Chief this week.

"It is exciting to have Jeremy on board as Deputy Fire Chief," said Chief Aaron Markham. "This brings us up to full staffing in that role and helps share the workload."

YFD operates with two deputy chiefs. YFD Deputy Fire Chief Patrick Reid was hired for that post in October 2017.

Rodriguez fills the deputy chief position previously held by Markham, who was promoted to Fire Chief in June 2018.

As deputy chief, Rodriguez oversees several areas of support operations such as fleet management, fire code inspection program, as well as facilities and apparatus maintenance.

Program offering free bus rides to City of Yakima pools

Yakima Transit provides rides each Thursday with each paid pool admission


Yakima Transit and Yakima Parks and Recreation are again teaming up to make it easier for swimmers to use Franklin Pool and Lions Pool this summer thanks to the Bus to Pool Program.

Each Thursday through August 25th, paying to swim in one of Yakima's two City-owned pools entitles the purchaser to a special Yakima Transit bus pass at no cost to and from the pools.

Bus service is provided from Kissel Park, 1525 S 32nd Avenue, every Thursday at 12:30 pm and head to Franklin Pool.

The bus will also pick up passengers along Mead Avenue and 32nd Avenue eastbound.

"It's a win-win situation for everyone," said Yakima Transit Maxey. "Bus Alvie Manager ridership is lower the in summertime when school is out, so there are seats available to handle swimmers."

"We like to be involved in programs that increase bus ridership and, hopefully, get more people in the habit of hopping on the bus to get where they want to go," said Maxey.

A lack of transportation often prevents kids and adults from being able to swim as much as they would like during the summer months.

"This helps solve that problem," says Yakima Parks and Recreation Manager Ken Wilkinson. "We are very excited about the opportunity to increase the number of people utilizing our pools."


