

City celebrates Miller Park upgrades





A ribbon-cutting with state and local community partners on June 22 marked completion of work at Miller Park.

Completion of a project nearly three years in the making was celebrated June 22nd with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at Miller Park.

A partnership led by Yakima Parks & Recreation created a host of improvements including new rims, backboards, lighting and fencing for basketball courts, performance area, walkways, restrooms, playground, picnic shelter and mosaics.

The mosaic murals, including a "selfie" butterfly mural at nearby Fruit Community Washington Center, 602 N. 4th Street, were made possible by the Millennium Foundation and its partnership with Tieton Mosaics.

In addition to community support, the Miller Park Improvement Project received \$625,000 in state funds.

A fundraising drive for Miller Park improvements was launched in September 2020 by Yakima Parks & Recreation in collaboration with local community members.

Miller Park celebrates a centennial this year. The City of Yakima purchased the nearly 4-acre site at 4th Street and E Street in 1923 and developed Miller Park as the City's first designated neighborhood park.

City begins sewer line inspections

The City of Yakima Wastewater Division is managing a project to inspect the condition of 360 miles of public sewer pipelines.

Work began June 12 and is expected to continue through 2025. It is being performed by RedZone Robotics, Inc. from Warrendale, PA.

Pipelines will be accessed through manholes that may be located in the backyard or side yard of residential properties, in city streets and rights-of-way.

During this project, the public may notice RedZone vehicles, crews and equipment in the area. Inspection work is scheduled for completion in 2025. RedZone will be working 7 am to 7 pm, seven days a week.

City's annual chip sealing program is now underway

The City of Yakima Streets Division began its annual chip sealing program on June 26th.


This year's project will be completed in the following order:

- 40th Avenue to 48th Ave, Tieton Drive to Nob Hill Blvd
- 40th Avenue to 48th Ave, Tieton Drive to Summitview Ave
- 32nd Ave to 40th Ave, Tieton Drive to Nob Hill Blvd
- 1st St to railroad tracks, D St north to the freeway

The City will have flaggers on site to help drivers access their homes and businesses and also assist emergency vehicles through the work areas as needed..

Drivers are encouraged to avoid work zones if possible. In order to reduce dust and to keep work crews safe, 20-mile-per-hour speed limits will be strictly enforced on the streets where chip sealing is underway.

There may be brief, occasional traffic impacts.

Residents asked to conserve water

Summer 2023 is expected to be a drier-than-usual season, which means it's a good time to be aware of our water usage and make every drop count.

Suggestions from the City's Water/Irrigation Division include:

To reduce evaporation, water the lawn in early morning or evening. Avoid watering during the heat of the day or when it is windy. Check toilets for leaks. Don't let the bathroom sink run while wetting your toothbrush, brushing your teeth or when shaving Check faucets and pipes for leaks. Keep a bottle or pitcher of drinking water in the refrigerator. This eliminates letting the tap run while waiting for water to get cold.

There will be intermittent road closures and detours during the project. The chip seal program in these areas is expected to last three to four weeks.

Access to homes and businesses on roads to be chip sealed may be restricted for short durations during the project.

Remember your pets when traveling this summer

Pets provide comfort and companionship, but as the weather warms your vehicle can be unsafe or even deadly.

Temperatures in the Yakima area often top 90 and even 100 degrees during summer.


However, even on an 85-degree day, leaving your pet in a vehicle for just 7 minutes exposes them to temperatures reaching 100 degrees. After 30 minutes, the interior reaches 120 degrees.

It's Hot Out!

Don't Leave Your Pet in the Car!

Windows cracked open don't make a difference. Studies show even when windows are left open temperatures in a vehicle can reach dangerous levels.

The Code Enforcement Office reminds the community that those who leave pets in a vehicle in dangerous temperatures are subject to a \$500 fine per pet. A car can overheat **even** when the window has been left cracked an inch or two.





Shady spots offer **little** protection on hot days, and move with the sun.

90° 102° 120°

Even if the temperature outside is only 70°, the inside of your car may be as much as 20 degrees hotter! On an 85° day, it only takes ten minutes for the inside of your car to reach 102°. Within just 30 minutes, the car's interior can climb from 85° to a scorching 120°.
