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Community input meetings set for possible MLK Jr. pool

Two opportunities planned for Wednesday, June 12th

Two community input meetings will be held Wednesday, June 12th, regarding the possibility of a community swimming pool at the City of Yakima's Martin Luther King Jr. Park.

The first meeting will be at 4:00 pm on Wednesday, June 12th at the Henry Beauchamp Jr. Community Center, 1211 South 7th Street.

It will be followed by a second community input meeting at 5:30 pm on June 12th at Yakima City Hall, 129 North 2nd Street. The 5:30 pm meeting will be held during the regular Parks and Recreation Commission meeting scheduled that night.

Three conceptual swimming pool designs will be presented during both meetings by Miklos Valdez of the consulting firm Counsilman-Hunsaker.





Currently, the City of Yakima's Martin Luther King Jr. Park, located next to Washington Middle School, has a spray park that is open each year from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend.. It is one of two spray parks offered by City of Yakima Parks and Recreation.

Members of the Yakima City Council Ad Hoc Committee are Mayor Kathy Coffey, Assistant Mayor Dulce Gutierrez and Councilmember Jason White.

During its regular meeting on January 15th, 2019, the Yakima City Council agreed to a feasibility study contract with Counsilman-Hunsaker for a pool at Martin Luther King Jr. Park.

Designs for the pool are based on the information provided from the Community Swimming Pool Ad Hoc Committee meeting notes from 2017.

Designs are also based on input received during the community input meetings, small focus groups, Yakima City Council Ad Hoc Committee and Park and Recreation Commission meeting in March of this year. "Miklos will share the concepts at the June 12th meetings and then answer questions and gather more input on the three designs," said Parks and Recreation Manager Ken Wilkinson. "He will also share estimated costs to construct and operate the possible pool."

Martin Luther King Jr. Park currently has a splash park, one of two the City offers. The cost for the feasibility study with Counsilman-Hunsaker is not to exceed \$35,000.

The pool study is being funded through the City of Yakima's Real Estate Excise Tax 1 funds.

Pickleball courts planned for Franklin Park

Work now underway to create eight pickleball courts at City park

The City of Yakima is starting work on creating eight courts for one of the nation's fastest growing sports – Pickleball.

Three of the six tennis courts at the City's Franklin Park will be converted to pickleball, a sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton and ping-pong.

Pickleball participants can play the sport either as doubles or singles with paddles and wiffle balls.

"The Franklin Park courts are older and need to be renovated," said Parks and Recreation Manager Ken Wilkinson. "We have a pickleball group that has agreed to help with the project and will provide volunteer labor and funding."

The renovation's cost is estimated at \$10,000, with City park maintenance staff providing most of the labor to save costs.

"We will also use the project as an opportunity to train staff on tennis court renovations, as well," said Wilkinson.

Volunteers sought for City boards, committees, commissions

Community Review Board, Historic Preservation *Commission among City* volunteer opportunities

The Yakima City Council is seeking volunteers interested in serving on City of Yakima boards, committees, and commissions.

The Community Review Board and Tree City USA Board each have one available position. There is one vacant youth position on the Parks and Recreation Commission. The Historic Preservation Commission has three vacancies and the Board of Appeals has two available openings.

It is the responsibility of the City

The Tree City USA Board consists of five members who must live within Yakima city limits. Those with experience related to trees and other plantings, specifically training as arborists, are encouraged to apply, although not all positions on the board require such experience.

Youth members of the Parks and Recreation Commission must live within Yakima city limits and be between 16-22 years of age at the time of appointment in order to be eligible to serve a 2-year term.

There are seven members of the Historic Preservation Commission, all of whom serve four-year terms and must live within Yakima city limits. Currently there are three vacancies on the Council to appoint people to serve on commission, which shall include at least professionals who have three experience in identifying, evaluating, and protecting historic resources and are selected from among the disciplines of history, architecture, architectural history, landscape architecture, historic preservation, planning, folklore, cultural anthropology, prehistoric and historic archaeology, American studies, curation, traditional building crafts, the practice of historic rehabilitation or restoration, finance and banking, law, real estate, or related disciplines.

There are no residency requirements for the current openings on the Arts Commission, whose members serve 4year terms. The possible available positions on the commission needs to be filled by a community member.

There are seven members of the Henry Beauchamp Community Center Advisory Board, all of whom serve 4year terms and must live within Yakima city limits. The board makes recommendations to the center operator and the City regarding management policies, operations, maintenance, capital and improvement needs. Appointees are based on recommendations of the board of directors.

The following boards and commissions have term expirations in June and may have positions vacant: Arts Commission, Henry Beauchamp Jr. Advisory Board and Parks and Recreation Commission.

There is no residency requirement for members of the Community Review Board, but the positions must represent different aspects of the public as a whole. Currently there is a vacancy on the board for a representative of the healthcare community.

There are seven members on the Board of Appeals who serve 3-year terms. It currently needs a mechanical contractor or developer to fill one of its vacancies.
