City of Yakima resumes yard waste collection service

Yard Waste pick-up available through Nov. 30

Yard waste collection in the City of Yakima resumed March 1st.

The City's Refuse Division provides weekly yard waste pick-up through November 30th.

There is a charge of \$19.50 per month for the service, which is limited to collecting grass clippings, leaves, and small branches.

Branches should be cut into lengths of 3 feet or less and not exceed 3 inches in diameter. All yard waste must fit inside the cart with the lid closed.



Unacceptable items for yard waste pickup include garbage, plastic bags, food scraps, animal waste, ashes, sod, building materials and tree trunks or large branches. The Yakima County landfill considers the items to be contaminants. Visit the Refuse Division's yard waste collection website at

City refuse trucks can pick up yard waste carts weighing up to 150 pounds. Carts exceeding that weight will not be collected by the Refuse Division. https://www.yakimawa.gov/services/ refuse/yard-waste-collection/ or call 509-575-6005 for details or to make yard waste collection changes.

Amnesty extended for delinquent court account payments

The amnesty program for delinquent court accounts is extended through March 31st. It offers an opportunity to help pay off fines in collection, avoiding future collection fees and legal actions such as garnishment or property liens.

Irrigation starts April 3rd

Monday, April 3rd, will mark the start of the 2023 irrigation season for the vast majority of the residential and business customers served by the City of Yakima's irrigation system. That's the day the majority of the collection of systems operated by the City's Water/Irrigation Division are scheduled to begin delivering water.

All City of Yakima irrigation systems should be fully operational by April 10th. The few other irrigation systems that operate independently from the City system will also be gearing up during April and should be fully operational by the beginning of May.

The season typically runs from early mid-October. April Visit to https://www.yakimawa.gov/services/wat er-irrigation/ for more information. After achieving some success, private canal companies began forming to bring water to more and more land. By the late 1800s, irrigation had proven its worth in unlocking the agricultural bounty of the Yakima Valley.

After a few years of lobbying the federal government, leaders from Yakima Valley convinced the Congress to study, and ultimately begin to build in 1905, a network of canals and other delivery system to turn the region into what its earliest settlers had envisioned – an agricultural powerhouse.

'Spring forward' on March 12th

Daylight Saving Time will officially begin at 2:00 am on Sunday, March 12th.

Clocks are set ahead one hour and many set their clocks to "spring forward" before going to sleep the night before, in this case Saturday, March 11.

When changing your clocks, the Yakima Fire Department suggests testing smoke alarms.

The City of Yakima has operated irrigation systems since the early 1900s. The system that now exists to deliver water to customers in Yakima actually consists of 66 individual, smaller systems that were consolidated almost 20 years ago into a single utility. Through that utility, the City currently provides water to about 11,000 customers.

The earliest known experiment with irrigation in the Yakima Valley is believed to have taken place in 1864 when water was diverted from Ahtanum Creek to help grow a few acres of crops for the Catholic mission nearby.

Over the decades that followed, irrigation systems in the Yakima area were expanded and refined. Today, irrigated lands within what came to be known as the Yakima Project total more than 460,000 acres, including lawns and gardens in the city of Yakima.

City crews continually monitor for potholes, repairing them as quickly possible to reduce further as damage to the roadway and to ensure safety for drivers.

With over 400-miles of streets in the City of Yakima, the City is asking for help in reporting potholes.

"Having residents and community members reporting the locations of potholes, greatly assists Public Works in their effort in repairing them in a timely manner," said Public Works Director Scott Schafer. "More eyes on an issue provide for better results."

Potholes are not uncommon this time of the year due to the "freeze-thaw cycle" Yakima experiences when precipitation, in the form of rain and/or snow, seeps into small cracks within the asphalt pavement.

The "freeze-thaw cycle" causes moisture to contract and expand; increasing the size of the cracks. As vehicles travel over these cracks, the asphalt pavement begins to loosen, thereby creating potholes.
