Randall Park marks grand re-opening

Ceremony on May 7th celebrated more than \$1 million in upgrades

The City of Yakima invited the community to celebrate completion of a project five years in the making with a grand re-opening ceremony for Randall Park on Tuesday, May 7.

The ceremony was held on the wildlife observation deck at Randall Park. It commemorated more than \$1 million in improvements to the park paid for through a \$500,000 grant from the state's Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) and \$600,000 in local donations and matching funds.


"With the community's support, Randall Park is once again a jewel and major asset for the City of Yakima," said Parks and Recreation Manager Ken Wilkinson. "Randall Park is much loved, and it is gratifying to see the outpouring of so many in supporting these improvements."

Improvements at the City of Yakima's Randall Park include:

- New picnic shelters
- New wildlife observation deck
- Basketball courts
- New restrooms
- Rebuilding walkways
- Repairing parking lots
- New playground equipment

New signage and fencing

- Installation of a bridge
- Removing sediment and deepening the duck pond

Upgrades now underway at Yakima Airport

Nearly \$2 million project to continue through June 28th

Work is underway on a nearly \$2 million project to rehabilitate the West General Aviation Apron at Yakima Air Terminal-McAllister Field.

Construction began on Monday, April 22nd, and will continue through June 28th.

The Yakima Air Terminal-McAllister Field is working with Granite Construction and JUB Engineering on the project. It involves the removal and installation of approximately 22,000 square yards of asphalt, replacement of aging airfield lighting, terminal building sewer improvements, and updating the aircraft parking area.

Passengers will still board through Gate 2 during construction. However, they will walk a bit further to embark onto the Alaska Airlines aircraft at Gate 3.



"We appreciate the public's patience as the project proceeds to completion this summer," said Yakima Airport Director Rob Peterson. "And we appreciate the FAA's partnership in making this vital apron rehabilitation possible."

Funding is estimated to be \$1.9 million dollars, of which 90 percent is provided by the FAA through a grant. The remaining 10 percent match is funded through the airport's Passenger Facility Charge program.

No local property taxes or City of Yakima general fund dollars will be utilized during this project.

Tree-mendous





State honoring Yakima employee

Recognition is part of state's annual "Drinking Water Week" outreach

Yakima Water/Irrigation Manager Dave Brown has received the Washington State Department of Health's (DOH) Commitment to Excellence Award.

He received the honor during the Yakima City Council's regular meeting on Tuesday, May 7th.



"It is exciting to see DOH recognize Dave for his good work," said Scott Schafer, Director of Public Works for the City of Yakima. "I appreciate his ongoing efforts for the City of Yakima and its residents."

Brown is being honored for efforts that include playing a key role recently in assisting two failing water systems in the area and helping them find a safe, reliable water source. Brown was nominated for this award by the City's Water/Irrigation staff.

Brown also chairs the Yakima Basin Integrated Plan Water Use committee and is a board member of several other entities and boards.

Brown has worked for the City of Yakima for 35 years. He began his career with the City as a Water Treatment Plant Supervisor and worked his way up to his present position. He teaches certification training and is invested in his staff's advancement and career goals. "He provides steady, reliable leadership in times of crisis," the DOH said of Brown in announcing the award.

Governor Jay Inslee proclaimed May 5 through 11 "Drinking Water Week" in the state of Washington. In his proclamation, Inslee noted, "...what we do today to protect our drinking water and invest in the infrastructure that delivers it will affect the prosperity and well-being of future generations."


