Franklin Pool will welcome dogs and their owners on the last day of the 2015 summer swimming season, Sunday, September 20th, from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm as the pool plays host to the 8th annual *Paws In the Pool* event.

Admission to the *Paws In the Pool* event is free for dogs, but owners do have to buy a general admission ticket which costs \$2.00 for kids, \$3.75 for adults, and \$2.25 for senior citizens. A family pass, which can be used for up to 2 adults and as many as 4 kids, costs \$13.00.

Whe *Paws in the Pool* event is always a lot of fun,+said City of Yakima Aquatic Specialist Jason Zeller. We get dogs of all breeds, shapes, and sizes. They really enjoy getting the chance to splash around in the pool, and so do their owners,+said Zeller.

No Fall Leaf Pickup Program in Yakima This Year

Due to budget pressures, the long-running free Fall Leaf Pickup Program that has been operated by the City of Yakimac Solid Waste and Recycling Division will not be conducted this year. The program was eliminated as part of the City Council \$2015 budget deliberation process.

Refuse rates were not increased in 2015 despite costs for the City garbage collection service having risen. The Fall Leaf Pickup Program alone cost the City about \$100,000 a year to provide.

Whe current refuse rates are not sufficient enough to support the free Fall Leaf Pickup Program,+said City of Yakima Refuse & Recycling Manager Loretta Zammarchi. Whoices had to be made regarding which services are able to be provided and which ones should be discontinued. The Fall Leaf Pickup Program was a popular service, but for now, anyway, the benefits of the program simply do not outweigh the costs,+said Zammarchi.

The Fall Leaf Pickup Program had been provided for several years, and since 2008 had included the distribution of free, biodegradable leaf bags. The bags were initially paid for with a grant from the Washington State Department of Ecology and the Yakima County Solid Waste Division. Eventually, the City absorbed the cost of providing biodegradable bags, which last year totaled \$45,000.

Yakima residents can still dispose of leaves and other yard waste through the Cityos Refuse & Recycling Division by signing up for a 96-gallon yard waste bin. The monthly cost of a yard waste bin is about \$12.00 (\$2.96 per week). Yard waste bins are picked up weekly and unloaded at the Yakima County Landfill in Terrace Heights where the waste is turned into mulch.

If residents want to have their plastic bags of leaves picked up by Refuse & Recycling drivers, they can do so at a cost of \$2.35 per bag, but need to make special arrangements by calling the Refuse & Recycling Division at 575-6005. If residents want more than 10 plastic bags of leaves picked up, additional arrangements need to be made with the Refuse & Recycling Division.

Whether the Fall Leaf Pickup Program will return anytime in the future is an open question.

We need to be able to be sure that the services that are provided can be covered by the rates that are authorized to be charged. As far as the Fall Leaf Pickup Program, that is just not the case right now,+said Zammarchi.



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
