#### <u>City of Yakima Planning Division</u> State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA)

#### **State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA)**

The Washington State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) Chapter 43.21 (c) RCW is a state law intended to ensure that environmental impacts are considered by state and local governments when making decisions. Project which are subject to SEPA review have public comment process which is used to identify impacts and possible mitigation measures.

#### Talk to a City Planner

The City of Yakima has adopted guidelines which utilize the size of a project to determine the difference between a SEPA exempt or nonexempt proposal. Yakima's SEPA policy is an adopted ordinance contained in YMC 6.88. In order to determine if your project will require SEPA review you may wish to discuss the issue with a City Planner. The City offers "Pre-Application" meetings in which you can gain a better understanding of the review process and potential requirements for your project from various City departments before you formally submit your land use application and pay the application fee. #### Submit a Checklist

If it is determined that your project will require SEPA review, the first step is to complete an Environmental Checklist. This form is prepared by the State and is used for all SEPA reviews throughout the State of Washington. When preparing your checklist answer all questions, even if your answer is as short as "No" or "Not Applicable". A fee must also be paid for the processing of the checklist.

#### **Additional Information**

Along with your checklist the submission of a detailed site plan and a vicinity map is required. Also, the Administrative Official may request additional or more detailed information such as:

- A soils report
- A geotechnical study
- A traffic Study
- A wetland or floodplain study
- A noise impact study

#### **Development Services Team Meeting**

All SEPA applications pass through the technical review process provided by a Development Services Team (DST) consisting of representatives from city departments, state agencies, and private utility companies. Should significant concerns about your project be raised during the DST meeting, a conference will be scheduled between you and the appropriate agency in order to discuss possible modifications.

#### **Threshold Determination**

After review of the information submitted for your proposal, the Administrative Official will decide if an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is required. An EIS is required if "significant adverse environmental impacts" are probable. If mitigation measures are identified which would reduce or eliminate the "significant impacts" and are agreeable to the applicant, a Mitigated Determination of Non-significance (MDNS) may be issued.

Many projects which require SEPA review will result in "no significant impacts" and a Determination of Non-significance (DNS) is issued.

#### **SEPA Comment Period**

Once the Threshold Determination is issued by the City, copies of the SEPA checklist and accompanying information will be distributed to interested state agencies and other organizations for the 14-day comment period. During the comment period the City may not issue any permits related to the project. The purpose of this comment period is to receive public comment on the environmental impacts of the proposal and the adequacy of any mitigation measures.

In addition to the circulation of the SEPA checklist to governmental agencies, public notice of SEPA actions will be published in the Yakima Herald Republic and issued in a press release. Again, one of the principal purposes of SEPA is to invite public involvement into the decision-making process.

#### **New Information**

If significant new information is received during or after the comment period, the Administrative Official shall reconsider the DNS and may withdraw or modify the Threshold Determination.

#### **SEPA Appeals**

Once the 14-day comment period is over, a 14-day appeal period will be in effect. Any appeal of a SEPA decision must be submitted in writing with an accompany fee. A public hearing is required to consider any SEPA appeals.

#### **Concurrent Review**

Often a project which is subject to SEPA review also requires another permit or application process (such as a rezone or subdivision plat). The review processes will be combined whenever possible to eliminate redundancy of review and make efficient use of time.

#### SITE PLAN INSTRUCTIONS

A Detailed Site Plan Is Required: On August 8, 1996, the City Council passed a resolution (No. R-96-91) adopting a requirement that all site plans submitted in conjunction with any building permit application, land use application, and environmental application shall contain certain information and be approved by the appropriate Division Manager. All information that is applicable to your proposal shall be checked off and clearly displayed on the site plan. It is in the applicant's best interest to provide a carefully drawn and scaled site plan with all required information. The decision on whether or not to grant approval of your development proposal is largely based on the information you provide. An application cannot be processed until an adequate site plan is submitted.

Please complete this checklist and include it with your site plan. The site plan must contain all pertinent information. Items not applicable to the proposed project shall be noted.

- 1) <u>Use Ink</u>: Use blue or black permanent ink. It may be helpful to draft the site plan in pencil then trace over in ink. Ink is necessary for adequate duplication.
- 2) <u>Use A Straight Edge</u>: All lines must be straight and done with the aid of a ruler or other straight edge. Use a compass when delineating circular drawings such as cul-de-sacs. Computer drafted site plans are acceptable.
- 3) <u>Draw To Scale</u>: Site plans shall be drawn to scale. The site plan template has a suggested map scale of one inch equaling twenty feet (1"=20"). Distances on the map must be as representative of reality as possible. For example, if the distance from a structure to a property line is 20 feet, the distance on the site plan will be 1 inch.
